Mayor Lennox called the meeting to order.

Declaration of Pecuniary Interest:

None declared.

OWNER/APPLICANT: Alette Holsteins Ltd. and H. Bye Construction

The Purpose and Effect of the Application

The purpose is to amend Schedule A6 of the County Official Plan by adding a Mineral Aggregate Area overlay to a 24.5 hectare area of the subject lands, within an existing Prime Agricultural designation. The proposed Zoning By-law Amendment will rezone the 24.5 ha area of lands from Agricultural (A) to Extractive Industrial (EI). This will permit development of a gravel pit operation pursuant to the Aggregate Resources Act, on the subject property.

Location of the Subject Land

The amendments relate to parts of Lots 5 and 6, Concession 5 in the Township of Wellington North (former Arthur Township). This land is located in the northeast part of the Township and has a municipal address of 7572 Sideroad 3 E and 9458 Concession 4N. These properties are owned by Alette Holsteins Ltd. who has entered into an extraction agreement with H. Bye Construction Ltd.

Power of OMB to Dismiss Appeals

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the County of Wellington before the proposed Official Plan amendment is adopted, or Township of Wellington North before the proposed Zoning By-law amendment is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision of the County of Wellington or the Council of the Township of Wellington North to the Ontario Municipal Board.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the **County of Wellington** before the proposed **Official Plan amendment** is adopted, or **Township of Wellington North** before the proposed **Zoning By-law amendment** is passed, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board unless, in the opinion of the Board, there are reasonable grounds to do so.

Minutes from the June 23, 2014 Public Meeting

Notice for this second public meeting was sent to property owners within 120 m, persons who requested notice in writing and required agencies on March 9, 2015.

PRESENTATIONS

Linda Redmond, Senior Planner, reviewed her comments dated March 3, 2015.

The purpose of this report was to provide the Township with an overview of the Official Plan application and provide the comments received to date to facilitate the public meeting. Further, this statutory public meeting provided an opportunity for the community and area residents to ask questions and seek more information from the proponent and their consultants.

The lands subject to the amendment are located at Part Lot 5 & 6, Concession 5 with municipal addresses of 7572 Sideroad 3 and 9458 Concession 4 N. The property is located in the northerly part of the Township approximately 6 km east of Mount Forest. These properties are owned by Alette Holsteins who have entered into an extraction agreement with H. Bye Construction Ltd.

The proposal is for a Category 3 (1.5 metres above the water table), Class "A" gravel pit. The purpose is to amend Schedule A6 of the County Official Plan by adding a Mineral Aggregate Area overlay to a 24.5 hectare area of the subject lands, within an existing Prime Agricultural designation.

The proposed Zoning By-law Amendment will rezone the 24.5 ha area of lands from Agricultural (A) to Extractive Industrial (EI). This will permit development of a gravel pit operation pursuant to the Aggregate Resources Act, on the subject property.

The site plan indicates that the area to be licensed is approximately 24.5 ha., and the area to be extracted is 21.8 ha. The proposed zoning excludes a redi-mix concrete plant, asphalt plant, aggregate transfer station or a waste recycling depot.

It is estimated that approximately 2.5 million tonnes of aggregate is present. The total annual volume being applied for in the license application to the Ministry of Natural Resources is 75,000 tonnes per year. Extraction is to stay at least 1.5 metres above the water table.

The proposed main haul route will be north on Concession 4 N to Highway 89 and west to Mount Forest. The hours of operation are proposed to be from 7am to 6pm, Monday to Friday and exclude holidays.

As part of the application, H. Bye Construction Ltd. has provided the following documents:

- Summary Statement for license application (January 2013)
- Fisheries Report (AET Consultants December 2013)
- Hydrogeologist Study Level 1 (Gamsby and Mannerow Engineers November 2012)
- Natural Environment Level 1 and 2 Reports for Class A Pit License (AET Consultants – Dec. 2013)
- Stage 1-2 Archeological Assessment (William R. Fitzgerald, Ph.D. July 2013)
- Site Plans for Class A Pit License (W.L. Bradshaw P.ENG January 2014)

The neighbouring lands consist of primarily agricultural fields/farms. There is a wetland area running through the property. There is a parochial school to the south of the property.

The area of the proposed pit is designated a mixture of Primary Agricultural and Core Greenlands in the Official Plan. The area is currently zoned Agricultural (A) and Natural Environment (NE).

Planning Considerations Include

Aggregate Resource Area Overlay Designation

In the Official Plan, the Aggregate Resource Area designation overlays other designations such as Primary Agricultural and Core Greenlands. It delineates an area of gravel resource of primary significance as well as existing gravel pit licenses. Section 2.5 of the Provincial Planning Statement as well as Section 6.6 of the County Plan protects such areas for extraction, provided that social and environmental impacts can be mitigated to acceptable levels.

The proposed site plan as submitted identifies the license boundary area as approximately 24.5 ha., and the area to be extracted is 21.8 ha. This is the document that would be approved by the Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) along with the license.

Core Greenlands

The areas designated Core Greenlands in the Official Plan are, for the most part, to the west and south of the proposed new Aggregates Resource Area overlay.

Saugeen Valley Conservation Authority (SVCA, April 2014) has raised environmental concerns which may require some modifications to the extraction area and requires additional information.

Neighbourhood Compatibility

The closest sensitive receptor is to the north (Ferguson farm), which is approximately 85 metres from the proposed area of extraction. Section 2.2.6 of the Aggregate Resources of Ontario: Provincial Standards states that "if extraction and / or processing facilities are within 150 metres of a sensitive receptor, a noise assessment is required to determine whether Provincial Guidelines can be satisfied."

A parochial school is located within close proximity to the proposed pit. Further analysis regarding the haul route hours and road conditions should be reviewed to ensure pedestrian safety given the foot and horse/buggy traffic to and from this use.

A number of letters have been received from surrounding land owners. The list of concerns is provided below under the public comments.

Traffic Impacts

Further information is required to determine the adequacy of the proposed haul route (Concession 4 N). A traffic impact assessment may be necessary to determine any road upgrades that may be required.

Zoning By-law Amendment

In addition to the County of Wellington Official Plan Amendment, the applicant has applied to the Township of Wellington North for a zone amendment to consider rezoning the same area from Agricultural (A) to Extractive Industrial (EI). The Extractive Industrial zoning would limit extraction to 1.5 metres above the water table.

A separate draft zoning amendment will be presented in the near future. As per the Planning Act, the Township cannot approve the associated zoning until adoption of the Official Plan Amendment by the County occurs.

Public and Agency Comments

We have received a number of letters and a petition from the surrounding neighbours. Some concerns and comments received include:

- Destruction of Agricultural land
- Site not suitable
- Truck traffic will damage roads
- Safety of Mennonite community travelling in area particularly to the parochial school in the immediate area of the pit
- Decrease in property values
- Dust and noise pollution
- Impact to the natural environment and wildlife
- Effects on wells and ground water
- No benefits to neighbors
- Notification of application was inadequate

Comments were received from Saugeen Valley Conservation Authority (SVCA) requesting deferral of the Official Plan Amendment and Zoning Amendment pending further information from the applicant as outlined in correspondence dated April 18, 2014.

Draft Official Plan Amendment

The draft Official Plan amendment was attached for Council's review.

MAYOR OPENS FLOOR FOR ANY QUESTIONS/COMMENTS

Brian Milne, Bill Bradshaw and Peter Fallis, representatives for H. Bye Construction Limited, were present to answer questions regarding the application. This company has been in the community for years – generations. They are sensitive to the concerns and feel they have addressed the issues raised.

Cliff Booi questioned the average of 12 to 15 trucks per day and the 75,000 tonnes per year. Bill Bradshaw explained that those numbers are based on the busy season and they may never reach the full tonnage. Mr. Booi questioned why they are asking for approval of 75,000 if they will only use 32,000. Mr. Bradshaw explained that dump trucks haul 22 tonnes and trailers haul 34. There may be days when there are 20 trucks and days when there are none. It is dependent on the contracts that H. Bye Construction as it is market driven. Most of the year it won't be excessive.

Wendy Schill asked how deep the pit will be, not how far above the water table it will be, and how many acres per year. She questioned if fill be brought in for rehabilitation. Mr.

Bradshaw stated the excavation will have a depth of 4 to 6 metres, which will be 1.5 meters above the water table. Rehabilitation will be progressive. The initial stripping will be used to construct a berm on the east side to keep dust to a minimum. They will fill with material on site.

Brett McHugh stated that there are 12 gravel pits in Wellington North approved for 845,000 tonnes. He is concerned about safety, signage and how the pit will operate in the summer with load limits and feels there are environmental considerations. The Provincial Policy Statement says that other sources have to be expended first. He feels properties will be devalued and residents will look for reduced tax rates. Mr. McHugh questioned the economical viability of this pit.

Cliff Booi questioned the amount of gravel that will be extracted from 20 hectares with a depth of 13 to 30 feet and asked if the pit will still close at the end of 20 years if they don't gquarry the approved amount of gravel. He expressed concern that the pit area to the south has not been rehabilitated, siting Google Maps as his source. Mr. Bradshaw explained that they will be stopping at 20 feet. The life of a pit isn't limited and pits usually stay open until they are exhausted. He also stated that Google maps is out of date and the pit in questions has been rehabilitated.

Victoria McHugh asked how this pit will benefit the residents. Mr. Milne stated that Mr. Bye will pay taxes to the municipality and asked how any business benefits anyone else other than the owners. Mr. Bye has been a proud supporter of this community through donations.

Joanne Booi commented on the maps available on the Wellington County Website that outline gravel deposits. Wellington North has a minor narrow vein of gravel at this extraction site. Mr. Bye has previously stated that if his company didn't extract from this site someone else would. Mrs. Booi provided that this is not his only option and others would not want this pit as there larger sources of gravel available elsewhere.

COMMENTS/QUESTIONS FROM COUNCIL

Councillor McCabe asked about the provision of dust suppression and road maintenance and expressed concern regarding the effect on the bridges. Brian Milne responded that 2.5 cents for every tonne goes for dust suppression. H. Bye Construction is amenable to conditions such as speed reduction. Reduced speed would reduce dust and flying stones and recognize safety issues. Matthew Aston, Director of Public Works, stated that the two bridges were included in a 2013 report and there were no concerns at that time.

Councillor Burke commented that through letters and conversations she is aware of many concerns. Councillor Burke questioned why there seems to be a sense of urgency to have this project approved and noted that after reading the report she is not convinced that concerns have been addressed. Bill Bradshaw advised that the application falls under the

Aggregate Resources Act. There are studies that have to be completed. The agencies have signed off on the application. H. Bye Construction has done all they need to do under the Act. They are ready to move forward.

Mayor Lennox questioned if thought had been given to planting trees to shield for dust. There are concerns regarding dust, gravel flying, safety of horse and buggy and bicycles. Mayor Lennox asked about dust control along the entrance to the road. Mr. Bradshaw explained that the pit is 400 metres from the road allowance. There will be dust control on the road. A water truck will be available when needed to help keep dust down. They are reluctant to plant trees that will have to be removed as part of the rehabilitation back to agricultural lands. Drivers will be instructed about concerns; they are employees, not contract drivers paid by the load. H. Bye Construction is in support of a reduced speed limit and will be paying towards maintenance and dust suppression.

Mayor Lennox referred to correspondence regarding the safety of horse and buggy and would like to see a strategy. Mr. Milne stated that Mr. Bye is aware of the sensitivities and that many members of the horse and buggy community are some of his best customers. He works well with them and will work with them regarding speed on the road.

Warden Bridge was available to answer questions from Council regarding the roundabout.

Councillor McCabe asked if this was the only option put forward and questioned why it is happening if the Township and public do not want it. He further questioned how the Township has a say about what goes on at County Council and if they would reconsider the roundabout.

Warden Bridge explained that there are three representatives for Wellington North Township. Mayor Lennox and two County Councillors. The County does not want to override the project which has been on the books since 2007. Funding wasn't ready in 2010. The Township has finally received funding in the amount of \$870,000. The government wants projects to be shovel ready to get funding. There is very little time to get things done due to tight timelines. This intersection was discussed at Roads Committee and staff was asked to come up with a safer, more functional option. This is considered the safer option. The County relies on staff expertise. The Roads Committee approved the roundabout. Mayor Lennox raised concerns but the rest of County Council passed the roundabout. This project needs to get to tender quickly or the Township could lose funding. For County Council to reconsider this decision it would have to go back as a notice of motion. Warden Bridge indicated that he would stand behind the County Council decision.

Councillor Yake clarified that this Council has not voted yes or no regarding the roundabout. It was a previous Council that discussed it.

Opening Comments (March 23, 2015)

Roundabout

This evening, on our agenda we have a presentation from Wellington County staff regarding the Frederick St. Project. I have requested that County Staff come and make this presentation to council this evening to share information, and answer council's questions. In March 2014, Wellington North Council passed a resolution opposing the construction of a roundabout on County Road 14, at the intersection of Eliza, Frederick and Domville streets. In that resolution, Wellington North Council expressed concerns, particularly related to pedestrian safety at that intersection. Since that time no information has come to this council on how the concerns raised would be accommodated.

As I am sure you are aware, county council, voted in January to proceed with the proposed roundabout at this intersection. It is my expectations that the information provided tonight will help us better understand how residents will be able to safely traverse this newly configured intersection. We will have the formal part of the presentation and then council will have an opportunity to ask further questions.

We moved our regular council meeting to this larger venue from the council chamber in anticipation that there would be a significant number of concerned residents who would attend.

The format for this agenda item will be:

- 1. Formal presentation
- 2. Then questions from council
- 3. I will then call a brief recess in the meeting to allow for everyone who wishes, to have an opportunity to view the display boards provided.

The parent council of Kenilworth Public School is providing us with light refreshments at the back for the recess tonight. Please help yourself to refreshments as you review the information provided.

Following the recess, council will resume its other business.

To the people in the gallery I thank you for your willingness to attend this evening. I know that this is an issue that is important to you. I also thank you in advance for your patience and understanding as we work through this process. If you have further questions, please pass them along to members of council.

- Get information on the functioning of the proposed roundabout

- Debate the decision to proceed with the roundabout

Questions from Mayor Lennox

1. How do we safely accommodate visually impaired pedestrians wishing to cross at the roundabout intersection?

The accommodation of visually impaired pedestrians at a roundabout is the subject of several studies. The issues are very similar to those associated with crossing any street, parking areas etc. for the visually impaired. If the accommodation of the visually impaired becomes a priority in the future, the answer to the next question may apply. The safety of the visually impaired pedestrians in a roundabout, even if no special features are added, are better than the current configuration because of the two stage crossing, only having to worry about only one direction at a time and only going across one lane at a time crossing the street will be safer. Special plates will be installed in the new sidewalk at the location of each of the pedestrian crossing areas to clearing identify the crossing area.

2. If pedestrian- vehicle conflict proves to be serious is the introduction of pedestrian activated signals at the edge of the roundabout a viable option and how would this function?

As mentioned at the Public Information Open House last spring, there will be duct work installed to facilitate the addition of pedestrian activated signals at the legs of the roundabouts to facilitate the installation of signals if required in the future. The signals would operate much like a midblock pedestrian signal. The pedestrian pushes a button to activate the signal to alert the drivers that a pedestrian is at that location wishing to cross the street. After the light starts to operate, the pedestrian is to extend his arm and point across the street to indicate to the driver that he intends to cross. The pedestrian is supposed to wait until he or she makes sure that the car or truck driver has noticed them and is slowing down and, ideally, that they have made eye contact with the driver and he or she is slowing or has stopped to allow the pedestrian to pass. When the pedestrian crossing area is clear, the vehicle would then carry on.

3. While providing the historical accident statistics for the current intersection, please provide an analysis of the expected change in accident statistics with the introduction of the roundabout.

We are not relying on historical accident statistics for a motive to improve the intersection at this time. The timing is partly run by the Township's need to replace most of the municipal services under Frederick St and the concerns expressed by nearby residents, former council members and staff and intersection users that something should be done to improve safety at this location and that we should not wait until we have fatalities to inspire us to act. Studies show significant decreases in accidents that involve injuries and fatalities, when a conventional intersection is replaced by a roundabout.

4. What would be the proper procedure for a school crossing guard to assist pedestrians across the roundabout intersection. If the guard will attempt to stop both lanes simultaneously will the visibility be good enough for the guards and the pedestrians safety. If the guard is only to block 1 lane at a time will the islands be a large enough safe haven to accommodate a group of kids safely while allowing traffic to pass in the other lane?

The crossing guard is the boss. There are many roundabouts that have crossing guards at them and you can be assured that the crossing guard at this location will be properly trained.

5. What provisions will be put in place to ensure pedestrians are confined to the designated area?

The crossings will be well delineated and with the efforts of the crossing guard at the intersection and the encouragement of parents and teachers, the kids will be well trained.

6. Since the premise of enhanced safety in roundabouts is based on keeping traffic moving what will the impact on safety within the roundabout be if the crossing guard or signals stop traffic while in the roundabout?

The impact will simply be that the "vehicular moving efficiency function" of the roundabout will be reduced for a short time. The traffic that is already moving relatively slowly will have to stop and wait. The safe crossing of children, by the crossing guard, is paramount.

I don't believe that the premise of enhanced safety in the roundabout proposed for Frederick and Eliza is necessarily based on keeping traffic moving. I believe it is based more on the vehicles necessarily having to slow down as they approach the roundabout, relatively slow speeds within the roundabout, and having 8 instead of 32 potential conflict points with other vehicles in the intersection. Keeping the traffic moving does serve to save fuel which reduces carbon emissions which would be of interest to climate change enthusiasts, and it reduces noise from vehicles stopping and then pulling away after stopping.

7. How can the various users become informed about navigating roundabouts safely.

If they have access to a computer, either at home, at school, or at the Arthur Library, they should visit the County site by typing in www.wellington.ca, on that page they will see a "A to Z" tab near the top of the page. They are to click on that A to Z tab and scroll down to the "R" section and click on the "roundabout" tab. There is some great information and an interactive video that will explain how cars, trucks, and pedestrians are to navigate roundabouts safely.

We plan to supply the Township Office with informational brochures and flyers, and to arrange instruction sessions through the school. We intend to have the Wellington County OPP involved in training and if the Township has some ideas they want to share we would be glad to pursue those ideas as well.

It will be good to be able to practice at home before you, or your kids when they are learning to drive, find yourself coming up to one somewhere else. (When I say practice at home I mean in Arthur, not at your home.)

Questions from Wellington North Councillors

• If a roundabout is the only option, will there be a public education and/or outreach program related to the roundabout to alleviate the fears that currently exist prior to construction?

Yes. This question is similar to the last question from Mayor Lennox. We are planning to have a variety of education sessions and website links to explain how the roundabout works and what is expected from drivers, pedestrians and school crossing guards..

 Has Wellington North Power been consulted with during the project design and have they expressed concern about how a roundabout will impact their servicing design? Are there additional costs associated with Wellington North Power's roundabout design and who is expected to bear these costs?

Yes. There will be different pole locations required and the County will be covering the appropriate cost of those changes made necessary from the road works associated with the roundabout.

Can you provide a recap of the intersection alternatives that have been considered by the County?

We considered options involving signalization, all-way stop conditions, a roundabout and leaving it as is.

Pedestrian safety is a primary concern for the Council of the Township of Wellington North, can you please
highlight the safety provisions that will be implemented during design to ensure every pedestrian can cross each
of the four streets safely?

Each street crossing location will be very clearly marked and signed and the operation of the intersection will be much more structured than the current intersection is. The signage approaching the intersection and the dramatically reduced traffic speed approaching and travelling through this intersection will improve the safety for pedestrians crossing the street.

• The lack of any mention in the Highway Traffic Act leaves everyone — motorists and pedestrians alike — with serious safety questions. Where do pedestrians cross — what steps will be taken to try and make sure kids cross where you want them too - if indeed you considered the people of the area that use this corner while walking from small children upward? Ultimately who has the right of way?

Pedestrians will cross at what will be clearly marked pedestrian crossings. Pedestrians have the right of way, however, they are encouraged not to and will be instructed/trained/cautioned not to step out in front of an approaching vehicle if they are not certain that the driver has seen them and knows that they are intending to cross or if the vehicle hasn't slowed down after you have indicated that you are ready to/ or intend to cross the lane. The school children and all other pedestrians are encouraged to access the roundabout information on the County's Website to see (among other things) how pedestrians can take their own safety into their own hands to cross the street safely. Please note that the roundabout that is to be constructed at Frederick and Eliza is a single lane roundabout which is even more controlled than the two lane roundabout shown in the video. Visit the "Roundabout" page on the County Website by typing in www.wellington.ca on that page you will see a tab near the top of the page that says A to Z. Click on the A to Z tab and scroll down to the R section and click on the roundabout tab.

• There is no definition of a roundabout in the Highway Traffic Act, this creates confusion...there are NO rules of the road here. Without clear guidelines how do we assume the safety of the pedestrians that use this intersection every day of the year?

The roundabout will be signed with regulatory signs as per the Highway Traffic Manual. There are clear guidelines to be adhered to for signage. Please visit the Roundabout page on the County website by going to www.wellington.ca, click on the "A to Z" tab near the top of the page, then scroll down to the "r" topics and click on "Roundabouts"

• Roundabouts are NOT mentioned in the Highway Traffic Act....the Province does not regulate them, how does the County propose to regulate them?

Traffic in the roundabout will be regulated as all roundabouts are, by regulatory signage that is used in the Highway Traffic Act.

This corner as it is RIGHT now has had no fatal accidents for over 40 years - why change it and make the
residents of Arthur and area take the risk - it is not your risk - of making this intersection worse for our residents
safety?

The County has chosen to be proactive and make some changes to the intersection when everything needs to be dug up anyway and not to wait until there is a history of fatalities at this intersection.

• The County bears the entire weight of this decision if indeed there is an accident....which there are serious concerns about...is the County prepared for this inevitability?

The County understands its responsibility to provide the safest road system as possible, including the Frederick / Eliza intersection.

• Sightlines for vehicles to see pedestrians seems limited when making right hand turns, would consideration be given to moving pedestrian crossing sections back from the intersection?

We have designed the pedestrian crossing sections as far from the roundabout lane as possible while still providing the safe haven on the splitter island halfway across street.

• There still seems to be a great deal of concern about large farm vehicles being able to maneuver through the roundabout, would a model or video be made available for residents to see?

I assure you that the intersection has been designed to allow large farm equipment to travel through this roundabout.

 Speed of traffic travelling into Arthur has always been a concern. Will implementation of a roundabout better serve to reduce speeds than just reducing the speed on County Road 14?

That is one of the strong points in favour of a roundabout. Simply lowering the speed limit does not guarantee compliance. Roundabouts slow traffic by necessity and are considered an efficient traffic calming device.

• The Township was successful in applying for OCIF funding for their portion of the costs associated with this project. The funding has very tight/stringent timelines-completion of capital design-March 31/2015, awarding of capital contract-April 30/2015, cut-off for incurred costs-Dec.31/2016. Are the project engineers confident we can meet these timelines to ensure that the Township does not jeopardize the funding?

If tenders go out tomorrow as planned, we are confident that the deadlines can be met.

Why has the cost of the roundabout escalated from a budget of \$200 K to a reported cost of \$400 K. The \$200K estimate included engineering / contingency / HST reference file M5967 dated Oct. 10, 2013, received from Wellington County Engineer.

The budget for the roundabout is not \$400k. The budget for the roundabout has not changed

• The intersection has been determined to be a "Safety" concern. Provide empirical data to support this position IE: traffic counts, accident reports, speeding violations, highway traffic act infractions.

I looked up the reference to the word empirical as it might apply to this question and confirmed that it refers to "a way of garnering knowledge by means of direct or indirect observation or experience".

This intersection was brought to our attention by the Township over 5 years ago with safety concerns asking the County to include a roundabout option in its consideration as a possible solution. These concerns were being relayed to the County from intersection users observation and from impressions residents who live in the vicinity of the intersection had of the intersection.

In the event that hydro poles need to be replaced, curbs and or sidewalks need replaced, who pays the
associated costs, County or Township? Will there be a interruption of hydro to the residential or commercial
customers which could result in down time of production when relocating poles and wires?

The County does plan to pay its appropriate share of work that needs to be done because a roundabout is being built. Wellington North Hydro does not expect any unusual power interruptions.

Have any socio-economic impact studies been done?

As the function of the intersection was not being changed, such a study was not needed.

• It was stated by a County Councillor that in 50 years the traffic flow will significantly increase. What are the traffic projections based on? What type of vehicles will be using the intersection more personal or commercial?

I believe that the statement was simply based on intuition; that over time it can be expected that there will be more traffic than there is today.

 With the increase to the traffic volume, what community safety precautions will be taken at the high risk intersection of Fredrick & Smith Street?

As part of this project, there are some minor alterations being considered at the George St. / Frederick St. intersection to address an issue raised from a previous serious truck/car mishap. No other plans are in the works for this area.

What steps will be taken to alleviate traffic congestion through Arthur?

The County is not engaged in the any plans related to this issue at this time.

What will be the impact to Economic Development and Urban Revitalization?

None are expected.

Has an Arthur By Pass been considered?

The County is not actively engaged in any plans related to this issue at this time.

 Why are County Councillors Voting against the wishes of their constituents and Township Council on the matter of the roundabout?

The majority of County Councillors believe that, although a roundabout may not make the intersection perfect, they are of the opinion that a roundabout will, at the very least make it better and now is the time to invest in a safety enhancement since the road and the intersection will be dug up anyway for the Townships work.

 Would savings from not constructing the roundabout go into a reserve fund to look into development of intersection at County Road 14 & Wells, turning lanes etc.?

I have never known that type of manoeuvre to occur, however, I guess there is a phrase that says never say never.

 A: Yes, Township staff have met with WNP staff to review and discuss capital projects of interest to both entities.

 A: The biggest priority in Arthur right now is capacity in the sewage treatment plant, not growth related projects.

We have a mobile unit that we will be using to run a youth drop-in program on Friday evenings beginning June 5, 2015.



Here are the 5 most common causes of electrical fires:

1. Most electrical fires are caused by faulty electrical outlets and old, outdated appliances. Other fires are started by faults in appliance cords, receptacles and switches. Never use an appliance with a worn or frayed cord which can send heat onto combustible surfaces like floors, curtains, and rugs that can start a fire. Running cords under rugs is another cause of electrical fires. Removing



the grounding plug from a cord so it can be used in a two-prong electrical outlet can also cause a fire. The reason appliances have the extra prong is so they can be only used in outlets that can handle the extra amount of electricity that these appliances draw.

- 2. Light fixtures, lamps and light bulbs are another common reason for electrical fires. Installing a bulb with a wattage that is too high for the lamps and light fixtures is a leading cause of electrical fires. Always check the maximum recommended bulb wattage on any lighting fixture or lamp and never go over the recommended amount. Another cause of fire is placing materials like cloth or paper over a lampshade. The material heats up and ignites, causing a fire. Faulty lamps and light fixtures also frequently result in fires.
- 3. Misuse of extension cords is another electrical fire cause. Appliances should be plugged directly into outlet and not plugged into an extension cord for any length of time. Only use extension cords as a temporary measure. If you do not have the appropriate type of outlets for your appliances, hire an electrician to install new ones.
- 4. Space heaters are a major cause of electrical fires. Because these types of heaters are portable, many times people put them too close to combustible surfaces such as curtains, beds, clothing, chairs, couches and rugs. Coil space heaters are especially dangerous in this regard because the coils become so hot they will almost instantaneously ignite any nearby flammable surface. If you do use space heaters, use the radiator-type that diffuse heat over the entire surface of the appliance. These are less likely to ignite flammable items, but should still be kept away from them.



5. Outdated wiring often causes electrical fires. If a home is over twenty years old, it may not have the wiring capacity to handle the increased amounts of electrical appliances in today's average home, such as computers, wide screen televisions, DVD players, microwaves and air conditioners. Breakers should be triggered when circuits get overloaded by too much electricity, but outdated breaker boxes often have worn connectors that do not work, causing the system to overload and start an electrical fire. Equipment installed in barns, may create a heavy load on the electrical system as well.

PREVIOUS REPORTS PERTINENT TO THIS MATTER

CLK Report 2015-009/PW 2015-001

BACKGROUND

A work shop hosted by the Ministry of Transportation (MTO) and facilitated by CIMA (Engineering Firm) was held in London, Ontario, on March 27, 2015. Additional work shops are scheduled for Thunder Bay, North Bay, Ottawa and Toronto. The London work shop was attended by approximately twelve municipal staff involved with traffic as well as CIMA and MTO staff.

The MTO is considering options concerned with the default speed limit as detailed in the Highway traffic act under section 128:

Rate of speed

- <u>128. (1)</u> No person shall drive a motor vehicle at a rate of speed greater than,
- (a) 50 kilometres per hour on a highway within a local municipality or within a built-up area;
- (b) despite clause (a), 80 kilometres per hour on a highway, not within a built-up area, that is within a local municipality that had the status of a township on December 31, 2002 and, but for the enactment of the Municipal Act, 2001,

would have had the status of a township on January 1, 2003, if the municipality is prescribed by regulation; (HTA, 1990)

The change alternatives that are the subject of the MTO's review include:

- 1. Maintain the current 50 km/h default speed limit;
- 2. Reduce the default speed limit from 50km/h to 40 km/h;
- 3. Permit municipalities to reduce their default speed limit from 50km/h to 40km/h; and
- 4. Permit municipalities to reduce their default speed limit from 50km/h to 40km/h by neighbourhood.

Director's key take-aways:

- 1. Speed limits in Ontario are set by the default speed limit established in the Highway Traffic Act S128 or by the municipality, through passing a by-law and erecting the appropriate signage along section of the highway.;
- 2. The driver's of this MTO consultation were requests by municipalities (City of Ottawa) and a recent corner's report, a pedestrian death review, that recommended lower speed limits.;
- 3. At the Ontario Traffic Council, eighteen municipalities were in favour of a change to a 40km/h default and eighteen municipalities were in favour of maintaining the current 50km/h default.:
- 4. There will be a Webinar by CIMA at the end of April.;
- 5. Traffic Engineers in the group stated a speed limit reduction of 10km/h typically results in an observed speed reduction of only 1-2km/hr.;
- 6. The best practice method of reducing driver speed was described as the 3E's: Engineering, Enforcement and Education.;
- 7. It was noted that Option 3 & 4 would create the legislative environment for additional public confusion in parts of Ontario with two levels of municipal government (i.e. Wellington County roadways through Township of Wellington North communities).; and
- 8. A change to the status quo of 50km/hr would create additional financial burden for Ontario municipalities as by-law amendments and additional signage would be required to maintain roadways at 50km/hr as required.

The Director of Public Works recommends the status quo default speed limit of 50km/h remains acceptable given the highways owned and maintained by the Township.

The consultation period on this issue remains open until April 24th.

BACKGROUND

Ted Arnott, MPP for Wellington-Halton Hills has written to ask for the support of the Council of the Township of Wellington North, in the form of a formal resolution, to rename Highway 6 through Wellington County the "Jack Johnson Memorial Highway."

Jack Johnson served as an MPP in the Ontario Legislature from 1975-1990. This year marks the 40th Anniversary of his first election and what would have been his 85th Birthday. He was the first MPP to represent the Riding of Wellington, which included the County of Wellington in its entirety.

MPP Arnott believes it would be a fitting tribute to rename Highway 6 – the highway that goes through the centre of Wellington County from north to south – in Jack Johnson's honour as he was the first MPP to represent all of Wellington County in the Ontario Legislature.

The Government has a process in place for renaming highways, one aspect of which is a resolution of support from each municipal Council the highway passes through. The criteria is attached hereto as Schedule "A".

Randy Pettapiece, MPP for Perth-Wellington has written the Ministry of Transportation in support of MPP Arnott's initiative. A copy of his correspondence is attached as Schedule "B".

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

It is MPP Arnott's understanding that the cost of a proposal like this would simply be the cost of the signs that would be erected and it is his intention to approach the Ministry of Transportation to ask they cover this cost.

If the Ministry of Transportation does not agree to pay for the signage, it could reasonably be expected that Wellington North may be asked to pay the cost.

Purpose and Background

Highway dedications are intended to posthumously acknowledge individuals and groups who have contributed to the health, welfare and prosperity of Ontarians, and to honour the sacrifice of those who have lost their lives serving the people of Ontario or the nation. Highway dedications with reference to environmental features (i.e. Woodlands Highway, Great Lakes Parkway, etc.) or other interests (i.e. Winery Row, Hall of Fame Drive, etc.) shall be referred to the Tourism-Oriented Directional Signing (TODS) Program for Tourism Route Signing.

A dedication may cover the entire length of a highway or sections of a highway that are a minimum of 40 km. When the total length of a highway is less than 40 km, the entire highway must be dedicated.

Guidelines

Technical research supports the use of numbers as the most efficient means of providing clear, concise, directional information. Highway dedications are not intended to replace the existing system of highway numbering, but to supplement it. As a result of this policy, highway numbers will continue to be the primary method of identifying highways on the right-of-way and the provincial road map.

Process and Qualification Criteria

Bridges

The dedication of bridges is reserved for police officers that have died in their line of duty in accordance with the <u>Highway Memorials for Fallen Police Officers Act</u>, 2002 and, therefore, do not qualify for signs under this policy.

Highways

Requests to have a highway, or section thereof, dedicated must be submitted to the Manager of Operational Services, Ministry of Transportation, Ontario in the region where the highway is located.



The application must:

- · Define the limits of the highway to be dedicated;
- Identify the group or individual being posthumously recognized;
- Provide supporting rationale for the proposal;
- Include a Council resolution from each Municipality/First Nation that the highway passes through supporting the highway dedication (municipal resolution not required in areas without municipal representation);
- Provide written support of the highway dedication from the MPP(s) of the riding(s) that the highway passes through.

MTO regional staff will review the material for completeness and forward it to Head Office, Traffic for submission to the Minister's Office through the Assistant Deputy Minister of Provincial Highways Management. Head Office Traffic will be responsible for maintaining a central registry of dedications that will include approved, denied and outstanding requests.

Final approval of a highway dedication shall rest with the Minister of Transportation or his/her designee and must be obtained prior to proceeding with the implementation of a highway dedication.

A highway, or section thereof, may only be dedicated once. For example, the Queen Elizabeth Way (QEW) or the Veterans Memorial Highway (Highway 416) are already dedicated, and are therefore ineligible for further dedications. Schedule A includes the names and limits of highways that have already been dedicated.

Freeway or highway interchanges are not eligible to be dedicated.

Sections within an already dedicated section of highway are not eligible to be dedicated. Sections of highway that are co-designated (or overlap) with another highway that has already been dedicated are also not eligible unless the dedication is the same as the existing one.

Trans-Canada Highway sections are eligible for dedication.

A specific highway dedication may be used more than once on different highways or sections of the same highway, as long as the sections are separated by a distance greater than 100 km (e.g. two highways or sections could be dedicated as "'Veterans' Memorial Highway"). However, those requesting the dedication should be asked to further qualify the name and try and make it different (i.e. classifying the veterans of a specific war – WW1 Veterans Memorial Highway or Korean War Veterans Memorial Highway).



A section of highway may span a junction of two different highways, but must be continuous.

Ceremonies recognizing the dedication of the highway/section shall not be performed within the highway right-of-way.

Implementation

Sign Design and Installation

Signs shall conform to the following design:

	Memorial Highway Sign
Individual's Name Memorial Highway	Sign Size: 600mm x variable (1500 to 2400 mm) Retroreflective Sheeting: Type 1
	Memorial Highway Sign (Bilingual)
Route commémorative Individual's Name Memorial Highway	Sign Size: 600mm x variable (1500 to 2400 mm) Retroreflective Sheeting: Type 1

Signs must conform to the standard ministry design as shown above. Signs shall include the name of the individual or group being identified in the dedication. Signs may include a crest/logo, but shall not include commercial messages or slogans, or other messages commercial in nature.

Modifications to "Memorial Highway" on the official sign may be permitted (i.e. John Doe Courage Highway, John Doe Freedom Highway, etc.). The modifications to the wording "Memorial Highway" must not provide incorrect directional or highway classification information. If the name selected references a facility, such as an airport, the highway must service that facility (i.e. John Doe Airport Parkway must service the airport). If the name selected makes reference to a highway classification, it must appropriately describe the highway (i.e. John Doe Freedom Freeway would not be appropriate on a 2 lane highway).

Memorial Dedications for Provincial Highways and/or Sections of Provincial Highways



A highway dedication under this policy shall have signs installed in each direction of travel in accordance with present sign installation policies as follows:

Sections less than 50 km in length – one sign installed at the beginning of the section, in each direction of travel.

Sections 50 to 100 km in length – one sign installed at the beginning of the section and one sign installed near the midway point, in each direction of travel.

Sections greater than 100 km in length – one sign installed at the beginning of the section and additional signs installed at approximately 50 km intervals within the dedicated section, in each direction of travel.

Fees

The proponent requesting the dedication shall be responsible for all costs associated with the manufacturing, installation and maintenance of the signs.

Where the proponent represents a not-for-profit group, the proponent may apply in writing to the Ministry of Transportation to waive all or part of these fees. When requesting to waive fees, the proponent will provide information on their ability to pay fees. Requests to waive fees are to be made to the Manager of Operational Services as part of the submission. Approval of this request is at the Ministry's sole discretion and the Ministry may consider a reduced number of signs to reduce costs if waiving fees.

BACKGROUND

At the December 16, 2013 meeting, Council passed resolution 19 confirming they received a petition for drainage works for the East Part of Lot 18, Concession 2 and appointing K. Smart Associates Limited to prepare a report on the work to be undertaken.

An on-site meeting was held on January 30, 2014 to scope local drainage issues and to hear concerns of impacted landowners. An informal meeting was held on November 5, 2014 to provide impacted landowners with information about the Drainage Act process, proposed landowner costs and watershed boundaries.

The final engineers report was submitted by K. Smart Associates Limited on January 30, 2015.

Pursuant to the *Drainage Act*, the report was circulated to impacted landowners and agencies within 30 days of receipt and a notice was provided advising landowners and agencies the date, time and location of the meeting at which the report will be considered. A copy of the Notice of Meeting and circulation list is attached as Schedule "A".

Pursuant to the Act, Council must approve the engineer's report and adopt a provisional by-law with first and second reading or not approve the report and provide the reasons for their decision.

If Council approves the work a Court of Revision must be held which is a meeting where landowners may appeal their assessment. All landowners who are affected must then be advised of any revisions and provisions for further appeals by.

After the appeal process has expired, the by-law will be given third reading, the process for construction of the drainage works can begin and benefitting landowners and road authorities will be assessed costs in accordance with the approved engineer's report.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The estimated cost of the engineer's report and the drainage works is \$43,105,99.







Dear Municipal Leader,

The Township of Madawaska Valley recognizes the struggle that many of its ratepayers in our rural area are experiencing with rising hydro rates and feels that, as a collective of municipalities, we must let our voices be heard to the Province. Similar to many municipalities across Ontario, we have an aging community, many on a fixed income, who have a decreasing ability to make ends meet. Similarly, industrial and commercial growth in rural Ontario is becoming increasingly difficult because of rising hydro rates; it is preventing younger families from relocating to our communities to help them grow. To that end, the Council of the Township of Madawaska Valley, at their March 23, 2015 regular meeting of council, passed the following resolution:

Moved by: Councillor Bromwich Seconded by: Councillor Archer 14-2303-15 23 March 2015

BE IT RESOLVED:

WHEREAS the cost of hydro has doubled and in some cases more than doubled in the past five years; and

WHEREAS the costs of electricity in the Province of Ontario is forcing businesses to consider leaving the area; and

WHEREAS many families are having difficulty keeping up with their monthly payments; and WHEREAS the Province's Long Term Energy Plan anticipates that consumers will face hydro rates that will rise by 42% over the next five (5) years; and

WHEREAS it is essential that the residents and businesses of the Madawaska Valley to have access to affordable hydro to thrive and prosper; and

WHEREAS Council urges Provincial relief to Ontario Hydro One Customers to reflect the means of rural residents to reasonably access hydro through a review of Provincial policies and their agencies that set Ontario rates for electricity, distribution charges, debt retirement, global adjustments costs and carbon taxes. Council requests, that this review would include consultation with rural and urban municipalities; and

WHEREAS Council reminds Rural municipalities to advocate the investigation by the Ontario Ombudsman regarding the major systemic issues identified by complaints involving overcharging of hydro, an explanation of line items on billing and, resolve of related matters; and

WHEREAS it is imperative that the Province of Ontario review their energy policies and utilize The Rural and Northern Lens advocated by the Rural Ontario Municipal Association to evaluate and assess the needs of rural municipalities so that they can succeed and thrive. Many rural municipalities have a population of 50% or more seniors on fixed incomes who are struggling to keep warm in low population density communities with colder temperatures that do not benefit from the heat retention in

condominium residences and whom are challenged by geography and climate scales. Our core sectors of economic development in our region, lumber mills and farming, are often under-employed and are subject to rates that are higher than other provinces due to impact of high delivery charges and global adjustment fees (that can be up to 2.5 times higher than the actual hydro used) and threaten the sustainability of families and agro-food sectors in rural Ontario; and

WHEREAS all municipalities that have a significant amount of citizens moving into the seasonal residences, that they are encouraged to inform those residents to seek relief from seasonal hydro rates through direct communication of such to their electrical utility provider;

WHEREAS all municipalities should be encouraged to monitor, through specific data categories, smart meter electrical fires and/or smart meter malfunctions that have resulted in explosions, and further to better assess their impact and the potential need of CSA approved meters employing codes and standards used globally by regulators and industry to facilitate safer and more sustainable products.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Township of Madawaska Valley CALL ON Premier Wynne and the Province of Ontario to take immediate action to prevent these and any other rate increase from being implemented; and

THAT Premier Wynne and the Province of Ontario be encouraged to do something to bring these rates down to a reasonable level and to do so as quickly as possible; and

THAT this motion be circulated to all Ontario municipalities for support.

The Township of Madawaska Valley is a smaller municipality, in the western quadrant of Renfrew County with approximately 4300 permanent residents, with a larger summer population. For more information on our municipality, please visit us online at www.madawaskavalley.ca.

WHEREAS Section 97 (3) of the *Drainage Act*, as amended, provides that "Where the lands assessed for the drainage works extend from the initiating municipality into a neighbouring municipality, the Court of Revision shall consist of two members appointed by the Council of the initiating municipality, of whom one shall be the chair and one appointed by the council of each neighbouring municipalities.

AND WHEREAS, under the *Drainage Act*, as amended, the composition of the Court of Revision for the Mainland Drainage Project, Branch B shall include:

Two (2) representatives from the Township of Wellington North;

One (1) representative from Town of Grand Valley

AND WHEREAS at the March 23, 2015 meeting, the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Wellington North confirmed by resolution 2015-014, the representative appointments for the Township of Wellington North Court of Revision for the Mainland Drainage Project, Branch B and directed staff to prepare the necessary appointment by-law.

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Wellington North deems it advisable to confirm the following Court of Revision Appointments.

NOW THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF WELLINGTON NORTH HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. ADMINISTRATION

That the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Wellington North do hereby appoint Council Steve McCabe as CHAIR and Councillor Dan Yake to the Court of Revision for the Corporation of the Township of Wellington North for the Mainland Drainage Project, Branch B.

2. ROLE OF COURT OF REVISION

The Court of Revision hears appeals on assessments being the portion of the cost of a proposed drainage work to be collected from the landowner.

3. CONFLICTING LEGISLATION

If this By-Law conflicts with the provisions of any Act, other than the *Municipal Act*, 2001, as amended, the provisions of the *Municipal Act* shall prevail to the extent of the conflict.

4. VALIDITY AND SEVERABILITY

- 4.1 It is hereby declared that notwithstanding any section, subsections, clause, paragraph or provision of the By-Law or parts thereof, may be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, unenforceable, illegal or beyond the powers of Council to enact, such section or sections or parts thereof shall be deemed to be severable and that all other sections or parts of this By-Law are separate and independent therefrom and enacted as such as a whole. Same shall not affect the validity or enforceability of any other provisions of this By-law or of the By-law as a whole.
- 4.2 Whenever any reference is made in this By-Law to a statute of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario, such reference shall be deemed to include all subsequent amendments to such statute and all successor legislation to such statute.

5. FORCE AND EFFECT

This By-law shall take effect and become in full force and effect upon its passing.



 - D. Boyd provided a verbal update with respect to this report as follows:
 - Precipitation in February, 2015 to date has been near the long term average in the central and southern watershed and below the long term average in the most northern parts of the watershed.
 - The average air temperature in February, 2015 to date at the Shand Dam climate station has been minus 14.8 degrees which is 8.2 degrees colder than the long term average.
 - The three large reservoirs (Shand, Conestogo and Guelph) are within their normal operating range for this time of year.
 - Observations of river ice conditions were conducted on February 17, 2015 at that time watercourses were ice covered throughout the watershed with some areas reporting very thick river ice
 - Lake Erie levels are close to the long term average for this time of year Lake
 Erie is almost completely ice covered with intact ice at the mouth of the Grand
 River.
 - Environment Canada is predicting below normal temperatures for Southern Ontario for the February to April period.
 - It is anticipated that the spring melt could occur late in March or early in April, 2015.
 - A request will be made to the Coast Guard at the appropriate time to send an icebreaker to break up ice at the mouth of the Grand River.

B. Corbett said he is glad to see that staff are taking proactive steps regarding the ice. He asked if the Coast Guard costs money. D. Boyd said that if proper procedures are followed to engage the services of the Coast Guard there is no charge.

Attorney General refuses to reopen joint and several liability

(Queen's Park) – Ontario's Attorney General today refused to take another look at joint and several liability and its effect on municipal insurance rates. In response to a question today from Perth-Wellington MPP Randy Pettapiece, Attorney General Madeleine Meilleur claimed the current system is "the fairest way" of dealing with a shortfall in damages.

"After considering the feedback we received from all stakeholders – from all stakeholders – Ontario has decided not to move forward with changes to the rules of joint and several liability at this time," Meilleur stated.

Government documents, however, disprove Meilleur's statement. According to documents Pettapiece received through a Freedom of Information request, the government's consultation was limited to four legal associations: The Ontario Bar Association, The Advocates' Society, The Ontario Trial Lawyers Association, and The County and District Law Presidents' Association.

Pettapiece blasted the government: "I've seen the Attorney General's files. They show you sought advice from trial lawyers. They show that you sought *no* advice from insurers, or municipalities, or taxpayers," Pettapiece charged.

Seemingly caught off guard, Meilleur accused Pettapiece of wanting to put the disabled on welfare.

"If your son has an accident, and he's totally disabled, you know, I will not be able to look into his eyes and say...we changed the rules and now you have to rely on welfare for your benefits," said Meilleur.

Following his question, Pettapiece was blunt: "For her to say something like that is ridiculous and insulting. I think she was upset for being caught not telling the whole truth about who she consulted."

In February 2014, Pettapiece introduced a private member's motion calling on the government to reform the joint and several liability model. His motion won statements of support from the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), the Insurance Bureau of Canada, insurance brokers, and over 210 municipalities across Ontario.

The motion passed with strong support from all parties in the legislature. However, at the August 2014 AMO conference, the government announced it would not move forward despite years of promises.

On February 19, 2015, Pettapiece introduced a new motion calling on the government to reform the joint and several liability model. He received very positive feedback on the new motion from municipal leaders at the recent Ontario Good Roads Association/Rural Ontario Municipal Association combined conference.

Dear Mayor Lennox,

I understand the fiscal challenges that municipalities are facing and that your tax dollars have to be used effectively. That's one of the reasons I was so disappointed to learn that some social housing providers are being forced to pay more than they should for services.

As you know, provincial legislation makes it mandatory for affordable housing providers to purchase gas and insurance through the Housing Services Corporation (HSC). A number of municipalities have found that they are paying more for gas than if they were to purchase it through other sources. As well, many providers are paying HSC an opt out fee (2.5% of the premium) in order to be allowed to purchase less expensive insurance that provides equal or better coverage.

I believe that affordable housing providers should be allowed to purchase these items at the best possible price – whether it is directly, jointly with the municipality, through Local Authority Services, or through HSC. I also have concerns about recent spending at the HSC, including frequent international travel and money transferred to subsidiaries and other for-profit companies.

To save municipalities money and ensure affordable housing dollars are used effectively I recently introduced the *Housing Services Corporation Accountability Act*. If passed, this Act will:

- Save affordable housing providers money on natural gas and insurance by removing the mandatory requirement to purchase them through the Housing Service Corporation;
- Restore accountability by requiring HSC to report salaries over \$100,000 as municipalities and government agencies do; and
- Give the Provincial Auditor the authority to audit the HSC without requiring a Minister's request.

I ask for your support for this bill to ensure that affordable housing dollars can provide the maximum benefit to help those who need it most. In case it is helpful I have enclosed a sample resolution of support.

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Housing Services Corporation Accountability Act, 2015

EXPLANATORY NOTE

The Bill amends the *Housing Services Act*, 2011 in the following ways:

- 1. Section 150 is amended to permit the Auditor General to audit the accounts of the Housing Services Corporation and of each of its subsidaries.
- 2. Section 151 is amended so that members of the Housing Services Corporation such as service managers and local housing corporations are not required to participate in any of the Corporation's programs or activities.

The Bill also amends the *Public Sector Salary Disclosure Act*, 1996 to specify that the Housing Services Corporation and each of its subsidiaries are employers for the purposes of the Act.

An Act to amend the Housing Services Act, 2011 and the Public Sector Salary Disclosure Act, 1996

Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows:

HOUSING SERVICES ACT, 2011

1. (1) Section 150 of the *Housing Services Act*, 2011 is amended by adding the following subsections:

Auditor General

(2) The Auditor General appointed under the *Auditor General Act* may audit the accounts of the Corporation and of each of its subsidiaries.

Access to records and information

(3) When the Auditor General conducts an audit under subsection (2), the Corporation and its subsidiaries shall give the Auditor General and employees of the Auditor General access to all records and other information required to conduct the audit.

Sample resolution for Municipal Council

WHEREAS social housing providers in Ontario are currently required to purchase natural gas and insurance through the Housing Services Corporation (HSC) or pay a fee to purchase elsewhere; and

WHEREAS social housing providers should have the right to obtain natural gas and insurance at the lowest cost to provide value to those in need of affordable housing and all taxpayers; and

WHEREAS the HSC should be subject the same level of accountability and oversight as government agencies;

THEREFORE BE IT resolved that the Council of (name of municipality) supports the *Housing Services Corporation Accountability Act* introduced by Oxford MPP Ernie Hardeman which would remove the mandatory requirement for social housing providers to purchase gas and insurance through the HSC, require HSC to report salaries over \$100,000, and give the Provincial Auditor General the authority to audit HSC.

Dear Mayor and Members of Municipal Council:

I am writing to you today with regard to *Bill 66: Great Lakes Protection Act, 2015*. The stated purpose of the bill is "protect and restore the ecological health of the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence River Basin" and "to create opportunities for individuals and communities to become involved in the protection and restoration of the ecological health of the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence River Basin."

It goes without saying that the Ontario PC caucus is fully supportive of improving and protecting our Great Lakes eco-systems. However, Bill 66 has raised questions with regard to the duplication of governance, the absence of funding to implement initiatives, uncertainty surrounding stakeholder representation at meetings of the Guardians' Council and the potential for further erosion in the power of local planning authorities and municipalities.

As you consider the impact of Bill 66 I would encourage you to apply the Rural and Northern Lens created by the AMO Northern & Rural Working Group. The lens is meant to be employed by provincial ministries to assess the impacts of new policy initiatives or changes in existing programs before they are implemented. I have attached a copy of ROMA's rural lens for your reference. I have also included a map that shows that 105 out of 107 ridings across Ontario are affected by the Great Lakes- St. Lawrence Basin Watershed.

As Bill 66 progresses I invite you to submit your feedback so that I can bring your views on Bill 66 forward during debate and committee hearings.


The Rural and Northern Lens: A Way Forward

It is a tool culminating in the sample chart below. It provides a quick visual representation of the positive and negative impacts of public initiatives. The need is obvious.





I wanted to let you know that my private member's bill, Bill 36 the *Respecting Private Property Act* passed second reading in the Legislature with all-party support. It has been referred to the Standing Committee on Justice Policy for public consultation.

Bill 36 has received support from residents and a wide range of stakeholders, including the Ontario Federation of Agriculture.

If enacted, Bill 36 would amend the *Trespass to Property Act* by creating a minimum fine of \$500 for trespassing and increase the maximum compensation for damages to \$25,000. Currently the *Trespass to Property Act* has no minimum fine for those who trespass, and has a maximum limit of \$1,000 on compensation for damages.


Bill 36 would ensure property owners are fairly compensated for destruction of their property, and signal that trespassing is a serious issue that will not be taken lightly in the justice system.

The Ontario Federation of Agriculture (OFA) has been asking for changes to be made to the Trespass to Property Act. The OFA would like a minimum fine for those who trespass and an increase in the limit for compensation for damages.

One of the problems that arise when people trespass on private property is they can end up damaging the property, including crops, livestock and fencing. Unfortunately, it is left to the property owners to repair these damages, and the costs can quickly add up to thousand's of dollars.

The Respecting Private Property Act will make necessary changes to the Trespass to Property Act. This bill will establish a minimum fine of \$500 for trespassing. As well, it would increase the limit for compensation on damages to \$25,000 from the current limit of \$1,000.

"Our members are seeing an increase in trespassing, both on foot and on motorized off-road vehicles. Crops are damaged, animals have escaped from gates left open. All the garbage left behind is left for us to clean up. There is also an increased risk in liability to our members, if injury occurs on their property. We fully support this bill, it will encourage deterrence from exposure to such cases, and we thank Sylvia Jones MPP for all her efforts."

PURPOSE

The proposed Official Plan Amendment will redesignate the subject property from Future Development to Residential. The applicant is proposing to develop the lands with a single family dwelling. The amendment affects Schedule A6-1 – Mount Forest and there are no proposed textual changes to the policies of the Official Plan.

LOCATION

The subject land is legally described as Part Lot 5, South of Clyde Street, and has frontage on Clyde Street. The subject property is currently zoned Future Development by the Township of Wellington North Zoning By-law 66-01 and designated Future Development by the County of Wellington Official Plan. Below is a map showing the location of the subject property to which the amendment would apply.

BASIS

The development concept for this site includes the creation of one new residential lot to be serviced on private septic and well. The Wellington County Official Plan provides consideration for the establishment of new residential areas within the Urban Area of the County.

OTHER APPLICATIONS

In addition to the Official Plan amendment application, a separate zoning amendment has been submitted to the Township of Wellington North for the purpose of rezoning the parcel of land from Future Development to Residential – R1A Zone. A severance application is proposed in the future to sever one residential lot from the lands.





If a person, corporation or public body did not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make a written submission to the Municipality of West Grey before the bylaw was passed, the person, corporation or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board unless, in the opinion of the Board, there are reasonable grounds to do so.

Explanatory Note

The purpose of the Zoning By-law Amendment is to change the zoning of the subject property from 'A3' (Restricted Rural) and 'NE' (Natural Environment) to 'M1-237' (Industrial Exemption) and 'NE' (Natural Environment). This rezoning will allow for a new industrial use on the subject lands, which is proposed to function as an expansion to the neighbouring abutting industrial use to the north east. The new proposed use is being proposed as a separate building (i.e. it would not be attached to the building on the lot to the north east). Holding ("h") suffixes have been added to the 'M1-237' zoning of this site to ensure that certain environmental matters are addressed prior to any site alteration or development occurring.

The lands subject to the proposed rezoning are also the subject of an amendment to the County of Grey Official Plan which would change the land use designation of these lands from 'Rural' to 'Space Extensive Industrial'.

The Council of the Municipality of West Grey has adopted this By-law and is now circulating it in accordance with Provincial Regulations.

- By-law No. 37-2006 is hereby amended by affecting a portion of the lands described as Part Lot 31, Concession 1, Geographic Township of Normanby, Municipality of West Grey, and shown more particularly on Schedule "44D".

Schedule "44" to the Municipality of West Grey Comprehensive Zoning By-law No. 37-2006 is hereby amended by rezoning lands described as Part Lot 31, Concession 1, Geographic Township of Normanby, Municipality of West Grey from 'A3' (Restricted Rural) and 'NE' (Natural Environment) to 'M1-237-h1' (Industrial Exemption), 'M1-237-h2' (Industrial Exemption) and 'NE' (Natural Environment), as shown on Schedule "44D" attached to and forming part of this by-law.
- 3. Section 35 of the Municipality of West Grey Comprehensive Zoning By-law No. 37-2006 is hereby amended by adding the following:

Notwithstanding the foregoing, on those lands zoned 'M1-237-h1' and described as Part Lot 31, Concession 1, Geographic Township of Normanby, Municipality of West Grey, no site alteration or development shall be permitted until such time as the holding suffix "h1" has been lifted, and such suffix shall not be lifted until either:

- a. The works and activities are registered with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, as per Ontario Regulation 242/08; or,
- b. It has been demonstrated to the satisfaction of the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry and the Municipality of West Grey by a qualified professional that the Bobolink and Eastern Meadowlark birds and habitat do not exist on-site.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, on those lands zoned 'M1-237-h2' and described as Part Lot 31, Concession 1, Geographic Township of Normanby, Municipality of West Grey, no development or site alteration shall be permitted until such time as the holding suffix "h2" has been lifted, and such suffix shall not be lifted until an Environmental Impact Study has demonstrated to the satisfaction of the Saugeen Valley Conservation Authority and the Municipality of West Grey that the proposed site alteration and proposed development would create no negative impact on the adjacent wetland feature or its ecological function.

4. That this By-law Amendment shall come into effect upon the final passing thereof pursuant to Section 34(21) and Section 34(22) of The Planning Act, R.S.O., 1990, as amended, or where applicable, pursuant to Sections 34(30) and (31) of the Planning Act, R.S.O., 1990, as amended.
