The Committee discussed the various art contest submissions and applauded all entrants. The Executive Assistant to the CAO explained that voting was completed by members of this committee and staff. A draft email was read aloud to the committee; this email will be sent to all entrants informing them of next steps. Once the decision is made by Council, staff will work with the Recreation Services Department to secure appropriate locations and with a local print/graphic design firm to ensure the art size and medium is suitable. Staff will provide the committee with an update on the progress of their development and installation.

# **Update on Workplan Items**

Workplan Item 1: Wellington North Farmers' Market

The Community Cultivator presented a PowerPoint that highlighted the ongoing success of the Farmers' Market this season. So far, they've welcomed 16 vendors, including several who have been with the Market for multiple years. Staff are actively reaching out to potential new vendors to continue growing the market. Market Updates:

Market Boxes: A total of 42 Market Boxes have been sold through the TasteReal Program at \$59.00 each. Each vendor contributes goods valued at \$6.00 to complete the box. The Wellington North Box was scheduled for July 30, 2024.

Kids Day: Kids Day was a great success, held on July 20. Activities included face painting, street chalk art, and Spanky's BBQ trailer. The event was very well attended.

Market Bucks: To date, the Wellington North Farmers' Market has received \$850 in Market Bucks. This program ensures fresh produce, and goods are accessible to individuals across Guelph and Wellington County.

Family Day: Scheduled for August 24, Family Day will feature activities such as an appearance by the Wellington North Fire Department – Mount Forest Station, street chalk art, face painting, and food vendors.

Workplan Item 4: Simply Explore Culture website

# CARRIED

The Community Development Coordinator provided a presentation on the website statistics, noting that the majority of the traffic is coming from search platforms. The average length of stay on the website is approximately 22 seconds for direct traffic (those typing <u>www.simplyexploreculture.ca</u> into their web browser) and 27 seconds for those who find the website via a search engine. The Committee discussed the value of the website in previous years, and recognized that without regular ongoing maintenance it is not of significant value. With the success of the Tourism Growth Grant application, the committee recognized that the new Driftscape app will provide better value.

Workplan Item 5: Wellington North Culture Days

Culture Days Rack Card Draft: The Community Cultivator shared the draft design of the brochure for Culture Days. This version will be circulated to the Committee for review and feedback.

Artisan Showcase: Members of the Committee expressed constraints related to the ability to chair the artisan showcase. Chair McDougall is going to reach out to June Turner to see if she is interested in running it again. If no one is available, then the show will not happen this year.

Workplan Item 6: Minto, Hanover, WN Cultural Roundtable partnership

The Economic Development Officer provided an overview of four key initiatives included in the successful Tourism Growth Grant, which awarded \$35,000 to the Town of Minto, Town of Hanover, and Township of Wellington North to support these projects.

Culture Days/Culture Bus: Create a Culture Bus Tour that will transport visitors and tourists to various events across our communities during Ontario Culture Days, from September 20 to October 13, 2024.

Driftscape App: This award-winning mobile and web app will allow our small rural communities to share their sites and stories with visitors in an engaging and interactive manner.

Culture Guide: Collaborate with Ontario Culture to create a guide that showcases the rich stories and diverse experiences our communities offer. This initiative will enhance the promotion of the Saugeen region as a cultural tourism destination, with the added benefit of increasing visitor traffic to neighboring communities.

Cultural Symposium: Host a Cultural Symposium in the spring to continue our joint cultural roundtable discussions. This event will bring together council members and committee members from the three communities to explore tourism opportunities, provide DEI training, and support initiatives like SPARRC (Supporting Arts in Rural and Remote Communities). This symposium aims to strengthen our neighboring municipalities by fostering cultural development in rural communities and expanding our collaborative efforts.

# **Other Items**

Your Town Rising: The Economic Development Officer provided a brief update on this initiative. The walkabout in the downtowns was successful in each community. Staff will circulate the slides from the evening presentations to the committee, received from Your Town Rising.

Barn Quilt: Member Cassan wanted to ensure committee members continue looking for the definition and description of the quilt that was provided when the barn quilt was installed at the Arthur and Area Community Centre.

Mount Forest Cemetery: Staff provided an update on the cemetery gate installation.

New Meeting Time: Committee decided to wait until the fall when there are more members added. This will ensure the meeting time is reflective of the wants of all committee members. Member McIntosh also noted that the ability for the meetings to be hybrid was appreciated, making them accessible to more individuals.

# CULTURAL MOMENT FOR AUGUST 26, 2024 CELEBRATING JACK BENHAM



In 1981, after Damascus Lake was excavated, a local writer, Michael Baker-Pearce approached Jack Benham about putting a walking trail around the lake.

Jack was involved with the Grand River Conservation Authority (GRCA), and along with a group of local volunteers under his direction after hours they planted trees, built a bridge, put up bird houses as well as mason bee habitats. The trail has been constantly used and has the locals cutting grass and helping maintain it. It is accessible off Wellington County Road 16 at the south side of the lake.

The next project was the River Trail, which officially opened in 2015. Along with Dave Stack and Ian Turner, Jack spearheaded the building of this trail. Dave approached

the local landowners for permission, and lan enlisted some of the local Lions Club members who would help clear brush and build stairways and a boardwalk. An Ontario Trillium Foundation grant was received to help with the costs of lumber, signage and some of the benches. Other benches have been donated in memory of local people.

The trail is 4.2 kilometres out and back, beginning at Lions Park on Smith Street. If you look closely at the right time, you may see a Pileated Woodpecker. When looking around the trees, their hole is an oval shape in a dead tree whereas the other woodpeckers make round holes. It is the largest of the species.

The Township of Wellington North took over grooming the trail and building a bridge over Farley Creek. Past Reeve and County Warden Doreen Hostrawser also was awarded \$2,500 for her service as warden, which she gave to the River Trail for expenses.



When the railway beds were abandoned and would be offered to the landowners along the track from Arthur to Grand Valley, Jack then took a proposal to the Township to acquire this land as a trail. The West Luther Trail, or the "Rail Trail," starts in Arthur on Eliza Street at the north end of town and goes to the West Luther/East Luther Townline. There is also a parking area and entrance off Wellington County Road 16 between Line 2 and Wellington Road 109.

A couple of creeks needed bridges so with a few phone calls, some flatbed trailers were located and installed to solve the problem. Railings have been added for safety. Gravel was added, signs, benches and now with the Green Legacy Project, many trees, shrubs and native flowers have been planted to enhance the experience. This trail is mostly maintained by a dedicated army of volunteers.

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# CULTURAL MOMENT FOR SEPTEMBER 9, 2024 CELEBRATING SATURDAY NIGHTS ON MAIN STREET IN MOUNT FOREST

Seventy years ago, Saturday nights in Mount Forest were a reward after a long week of hard work, rural chores, restraint and anticipation. Most people shopped only once a week and that was on Saturdays when husbands had the time to bring their wives into town when many women did not drive. For some, if it was all they could afford, they would just sit in their truck and watch the faces go by.

People from town parked in the afternoon in order to have a parking spot for the evening. This was a practice that annoyed farm folk, as they would rush through their chores to arrive early for the only break in their week. Town historian Fred McLuhan wrote, "Saturday night could be had for not much more than a dollar. This would pay your way to the show, ice cream sundae, a hot dog or hamburger and a couple of drafts."

An early evening parade would kick off every Saturday summer evening with the bands playing at Wellington and Main streets. After that, with everything open from the taverns to the library to the Roxy, the night was yours.

If you were young and had a car, you had to make time to cruise the main drag. To the north, you turned at the Fina and then south to Reynold's White Rose, but you could change it up by turning a little sooner. Even if you were driving your parents' car, you rolled down the window, cranked up the tunes and took your best girl for the ride. The important thing was to be seen and to see who else was in town that evening.

Mount Forest could boast as many as 18 hotels in 1880, but with the arrival of the automobile and better roads, travel became easier. By 1950, there were three popular hotels that survived the march of progress: The Kent, the Belmont and the Mount Royal.

On any given Saturday night, the taverns of these three hotels were boisterous, busy and boozy. Each one had a character of its own and it was reflected in their patrons. Of course, there were many townspeople who would not frequent the taverns ever or consider themselves "hotel people." But for those who were so inclined, the basic Kent, the workingclass Belmont or the dressier Mount Royal all saw fights and friends, heard belly laughs and whispered secrets, and witnessed tall tales and quiet tears.

And then there were dances. For Mount Forest, it was the Oddfellows Hall. These were dances where romances were started or hearts were broken, but if you were lucky enough to scrape together the 50¢, they were a social must. Once George Plume took your money at the door, the music hit you as you entered the Hall. Even if you were a shy young man who just stood and watched the girls dance, you could be entertained by jivers like Jim McLuhan who never missed a beat.

Ted Linder's garage and hot dog stand was a popular place to park your car, where it could be clearly admired and meet up with friends on any Saturday night. For all the locals, it was simply known as Ted's. If you could save 25¢ from the grocery money on Saturday night and set it on the counter in exchange for one of Ted's footlong hot dogs, you felt like a King. They were thought to be one of the best dogs in the country, and to taste them was to love them. Everyone seemed to have a weakness for a footlong topped with Ted's home-made, much guarded secret mustard and relish. Ted's Place was more than just a hot dog stand. It was a meeting place for friends and neighbours.

# THE WELLINGTON NORTH CULTURAL ROUNDTABLE

In 2014, under the leadership of April Marshall and Dale Small after the Municipal Cultural Plan was adopted in 2013, the Wellington North Cultural Roundtable was formed.

The first committee planned Doors Open, the Wellington North Farmers' Market and Cultural Mapping.

The Farmers' Market opened on May 20, 2014 at the Victory Community Centre and celebrated 10 successful seasons in 2024. It was originally on Friday afternoon but has since moved to Saturday mornings with improved signage, and an increase in vendors and patrons.

Doors Open is an annual province-wide themed activity which was very well attended as a one-day driving tour with a passport. In the following years, the Cultural Roundtable moved to promote Culture Days during September and early October.

From the original Municipal Cultural Plan came a recommendation to create a cultural map, as well as forming a Heritage and Architectural Preservation Committee. Council has approved our recommendation of naming future streets in both Arthur and Mount Forest to be culturally significant.

In 2017, the entire committee became involved in writing the Cultural Moments to be read at Council meetings, one per month. In 2024, the committee aims to present one Cultural Moment per meeting, which are now accompanied by a video. It has been a wonderful experience to research and put together these culturally significant facts and a bit of folklore.

The Mount Forest Cemetery project came to the committee to photograph and publish headstones in the cemetery to the Find a Grave website. About 3,500 pictures have been added to the website with sincere thanks from family members and researchers who have used them.

Celebration planning for the Township's 20th anniversary, as well as our committee meetings, were interrupted by COVID-19. We moved to Zoom meetings for 15 months when it was not feasible to plan any cultural events.

With the help of a summer student, the committee has been able to support and expand on several initiatives. One such initiative was a Mount Forest Cemetery walk, organized and researched by Morgan McCannell. The entry fee to participate was a donation to the local food bank, and the event was sold out.

The Poppy Project in Arthur was launched leading up to the 150th anniversary of the Village of Arthur. The community really came through, with over 1,800 poppies donated. They were attached to netting and have been displayed the past two years for Remembrance Day.

Support and sponsorship of our local cultural events and people have included the Lynes Blacksmith Shop, musicians who play at the Mount Forest Fireworks Festival, Arthur Fall Fair and Metz Pumpkinfest, Four Corners Quilters' Guild, a veteran's book published by the Arthur Historical Society, Northern Lights Keyboard Kamp, a barn quilt trail brochure and a Barn Quilt with the Cultural Roundtable logo at the Arthur and Area Community Centre. In 2024, the Cultural Roundtable supported the 25th Anniversary of Amalgamation events, including the Art Contest, of which the winning entries will be installed at one of three Township-owned buildings later this year.

# CULTURAL MOMENT FOR OCTOBER 7, 2024 CELEBRATING CHARLES RANKIN

Charles Rankin was born in 1797 in Ireland and came to Montreal with his parents after the War of 1812. He was appointed as the Deputy Provincial Land Surveyor (PLS) for Upper Canada in 1820, and began surveying the Garafraxa Colonization Road (known today as Highway 6) from Oakville to Owen Sound in 1837.

He married Elizabeth Leech in 1840. They had one daughter, Mary, and they eventually settled in Owen Sound.

Rankin is one of the most well-known and accurate surveyors for Upper Canada. His story and association with Chief Nawash was retold by Kate Rowley at a Tree Trust ceremony on Saturday, September 21, 2024 in Mount Forest behind the old Foodland. It's a history of our First Peoples and their contribution to our natural and physical heritage.

It is well known that the Department of Indian Affairs (operating as part of the British War Office) gave no consideration to the knowledge of Indigenous Peoples. However, early surveyors were different. Setting out into rough Ontario wilderness required that they were more respectful of the knowledge, experience and skills that leaders like Ojibway First Nations Chief Nawash might offer. Charles appears to have been fairly welcoming to the chief, and he is said to have thought that the chief "had aided him with the most accurate information of the courses of the rivers and streams of the area."

When surveying the Garafraxa Road in 1837, Rankin charted his well-known "digression" around Luther Swamp; he travelled on "a north-western course to avoid the swamps of Luther, intending to run north as soon as the swamps were passed." At that turning point and reaching a river with rapids, he was joined by Chief Nawash, who had travelled south through the woods from his settlement near Owen Sound to meet the surveyor on his request. Nawash told Rankin that the river was part of the 'Saugin', and Rankin marked it so in his report.

The government thought Rankin's digressions had made his road line too crooked and would be very expensive to lay. They had it re-surveyed in 1841 for a more direct route. The surveyor John McDonald, working on his own, disregarded Nawash and Rankin's notes and falsely identified the same river as part of the Maitland. He was mistaken, and a government exploration party was sent down the Saugeen River in canoes in 1844 to solve the discrepancy. Chief Nawash was

accurate, and the settlement that had become known as Maitland Hills for several years was soon changed to the much more appropriate name of Mount Forest. It is one of so many small stories of Indigenous history that had every influence on the location and identification of early settlement in Ontario towns.

His death records are disputable. He may have died March 15, 1886 and be buried alongside his parents in Toronto, or he may have died on October 12, 1888 and be buried in Owen Sound. Part of his legacy is in the formation of Highway 6 and a river in Bruce County which is named after him.
